Harris History Talk Series - Feminism, Homophobia and Adultery

Professor John Belchem

Join Professor John Belchem (University of Liverpool) as we take a look at Henry Hunt, the star orator at the ill-fated meeting at Manchester in August 1819 which resulted in the Peterloo massacre. Henry Hunt was finally elected MP for Preston in December 1830 and pledged to present every petition sent to him. He duly introduced Mary Smith's pioneer petition for female suffrage in August 1832, calling for the vote for unmarried women. Historians have simply noted how the petition was greeted with derision, but it merits deeper study, not least because its vindication of the rights of women is accompanied by virulent condemnation of male homosexuality. An early milestone on the long journey to secure votes for women, Mary Smith's petition reveals political, personal and sexual divisions in early 19th century radicalism – over feminism homosexuality and adultery - attitudes and prejudices which inhibited any decisive pre-Victorian advance beyond manhood suffrage. The **Preston Jazz and Improvisation Festival** is returning to raise the roof and get the whole city swinging once again this summer after its triumphant debut in 2018. An international cast of jazz, funk, blues, soul and hip-hop artists will be descending on the streets and music venues of Preston for a packed programme of live performances, jam sessions and workshops taking place from Saturday 1 June until Saturday 8 June.

We're set to build on the incredible success of last year's festival when we were privileged to be entertained by internationally-renowned jazz greats such as Courtney Pine and popular local stars including Harold Salisbury and Harvey Brittain.

This year we are delighted to confirm the welcome return of Graham Massey, founder member of techno pioneers 808 State, and building on the success of 2018's 'Day of Django' event we'll be hosting another 'gypsy jazz' extravaganza featuring world-class musicians Stochelo Rosenberg and Paulus Schafer alongside the award-winning Giacomo Smith.

Other highlights are set to include 'Jazz in the City', which will bring the streets of Preston to life with a variety of accessible music events that everyone is encouraged to take part in. Also look out for a conference featuring music industry experts, community facing workshops and an audience with hip hop producer Johnny Jay, who will be exploring Jazz and its presence in today's popular music. For the thrilling finale we are working on an incredibly exciting collaboration with one of the world's top labels in the Jazz spectrum.

Festival director Tony Rigg, from UCLan's School of Journalism, Media and Performance, says: "Last year's festival was a tremendous success, featuring more than 40 performances from over 200 musicians, including some of the most exciting talent from all over the world and the UK. We're especially proud that we enabled so many members of the public to get involved by coming along to the shows and even bringing along their own instruments and joining in with jam sessions and street performances. There really is something for everyone."

Many events will be free to attend. The full line-up will be revealed in March.

ART UNLEASHED

Derelict is bringing art and live performance to the people of Preston in surprising locations and in unexpected ways...

Derelict is an arts showcase like no other. Original, guirky and anarchic in equal measure, it has been successfully delivering on its daring mission to drag culture and live performance out of the typical confines of art galleries, museums and theatres. Instead, Derelict has sought to unleash art onto the streets of Preston, delivering unique performances in unexpected spaces where people are going about their everyday lives. As well as providing a public platform for exciting new talent, Derelict is making a huge contribution to Preston's emergence as a thriving cultural city by bringing performances to the people. Popup installations, micro-festivals and one-off spectacles have been staged amidst the hubbub of shopping centres, market halls, alleyways and public squares.

Derelict is a not-for-profit endeavour supported by UCLan, Arts Council England and Preston City Council. There have been numerous highlights since the project's inception in 2007, not least the dramatic staging Zuppa Theatre's 'Pop Up Love Party' in a Preston restaurant, while attendees were treated to a sumptuous feast served up by a Michelin star chef. Or the unexpected appearance of a mysterious shipping container in the shadow of the Harris Building which aroused the curiosity of passers-by in spring 2016. Those who ventured inside the atmospheric Séance experience found themselves transported into a 19th century clairvoyant's parlour replete with stately armchairs, lanterns and overhead

gas lamps. Wearing headphones, visitors were taken on a thrilling funfair experience which utilised immersive 3D binaural sound to narrate a terrifying journey through the world of the supernatural, culminating in the depths of hell – at the end of the experience, the floor (seemingly) disappeared beneath their feet, sending them plunging into the fiery abyss!

Other memorable installations have included a pop-up boutique which materialised in St George's Shopping Centre for 10 days. 'This Grief Thing', from the minds of artists Fevered Sleep, addressed contemporary attitudes towards the still-taboo subject of bereavement, particularly the reluctance of modern society to face our own mortality. The store's wares – from clothing emblazoned with slogans to Victorian-style black brooches (once worn during periods of mourning) invited people to open up and discuss this most harrowing of personal experiences.

Derelict has also been responsible for staging some remarkable public spectacles. In September 2018 excited crowds of people swathed in red and white set off from Preston's Covered Market and tore through the streets of Preston in a thrilling, visceral re-enactment of the infamous 'running of the bulls' festival held annually in Pamplona, Spain. This time there was no rampaging bull, but the event invited parallels with the

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ancient sport of 'bull-baiting' which drew bloodthirsty crowds in Preston's Flag Market up until the early 18th century, when the practice was rightly outlawed.

Director Chris Gilligan is looking forward to unveiling plans for 'Derelict Mayhem,' a new festival which will explode onto the streets of Preston later in 2019. The full programme is being kept tightly under wraps for now, but expect the unexpected. "Through this festival and the continued work of Derelict, we're engaging and inspiring the whole community of Preston," he says. "We're opening up the arts to new audiences and encouraging greater participation in the city and across the North West. I can't wait to reveal what we have in store for 2019."

How to find us

UCLan is conveniently situated within walking distance of Preston railway station, about a 10-minute walk. If you are coming on foot from the train station, exit from the station's main entrance, turn right and then left down Corporation Street to Ringway. Cross Ringway at the lights, turn right, then take first left down Corporation Street (shops including Aldi on your left). Continue straight ahead and follow signs to the University. If travelling via bus, the number 31 bus service runs every 15 minutes from Preston bus station and stops outside the University's C&T Building, which is located close to the Media Factory and Hanover and Victoria Buildings. If you are travelling on foot from Preston bus station, the journey is a 15-minute walk. Head towards Lancaster Road until you arrive at the Cenotaph. Turn right downhill on Friargate. Walk through the pedestrianised area down to the traffic lights at Ringway. Cross Ringway and continue up Friargate. Follow signs to the University.
